Dorsal Fin: Sickle-shaped dorsal fin, usually curved and slightly rounded at the tip



Dorsal Fin: Strongly curved ("hooked") dorsal fin with a large base; found far forward on its body



Dorsal Fin: "Bow" shaped dorsal fin located in the middle of the back



Dorsal Fin: Unmistakenly large dorsal fins; males have straight fins while females and juvenile dorsal fins are curved



Fluke: Small in relation to body size



Fluke: Fluke has pointed/curved tips



Fluke: Broad fluke



Fluke: Large, triangular fluke that is often black on top and white on bottom



Other Key Identifiers: Long, slender head tapers to rounded snout with no pronounced beak; Long, curved flipper with a pronounced corner or an's' shape; Dark grey/black body color Other Key Identifiers: Bulbous melon head with no obvious rostrum; Long slender sickle-shaped flippers positioned close to the head; Small mouth that slants upward toward eye; Large gray saddle behind the dorsal fin

Other Key Identifiers: Small head with a rounded melon and no discernible beak; Decorated with white markings on their lips and dark 'masks' around the eyes; Pectoral fins are long and pointed Other Key Identifiers: Rounded head that tapers to a point; Large, wide paddle-shaped pectoral fins; Oval shaped white patch behind each eye; White chin and belly patch; Large, robust body; Pale grey saddle patch (variable between populations)

Dorsal Fin: Relatively large and located behind the mid-back

Dorsal Fin: Small dorsal fins that are low, thick, and usually rounded


Dorsal Fin: Small, rounded dorsal fin located further back along its body




Dorsal Fin: Small fin located near the middle of the back; slightly larger and more forward compared to pygmy sperm whales











Fluke: Relatively broad fluke

Fluke: Blunt, triangular shaped fluke







Other Key Identifiers: Small head with a rounded melon that extends in front of the mouth, and no discernable rostrum: relatively long, pointed, tapering pectoral fins; small white areas on the lips and belly; narrow cape that dips only slightly below the dorsal fin and a light gray ventral band

Other Key Identifiers: Mostly dark grey; heads are extremely large accounting for up to one-third of the total length; lower jaw is narrow; paddle-shaped pectoral flippers that are small compared to their body size; skin just behind the head is often wrinkled

Other Key Identifiers: Extremely similar to the dwarf sperm whale; Pointed snout with a narrow, underslung jaw; Wrinkled brown to blue-grey skin; Slight bump on back; 'Bracket' shaped false gill marking on the head; Underside is pale with pink or white tones; Thin tailstock

Other Key Identifiers: Extremely similar to the pygmy sperm whale; Brown to blue-grey colored back with white to pink undertones underneath; Square head with snort snout; Flatter back than pygmy sperm whales; 'Bracket' shaped false gill marking on the head





Dorsal Fin: Dorsal fins range from slightly curved to erect and triangular







Dorsal Fin: Distinctively large dorsal fin that is typically hooked or curved





Fluke: Small crescent shaped fluke

Fluke: Stocky, relatively borad fluke



Fluke: Broad, curved fluke with a deep median notch



Fluke: Characteristically wide, triangular fluke shape



Other Key Identifiers: Relatively small compared to other species with thin and slender bodies; Small, pointed pectoral fins; Long, slim beaks; Try-partite color pattern with colors ranging from dark grey to black, light grey, and white; Only species of dolphin that naturally jump and

spin in the air

Other Key Identifiers: Long, slender, white-tipped beak; Pale spots increase as the individual ages; Dark coloration (cape) on their backs; Distinct keel below tail stock (except on large males); Dark band between upper jaw and eye; Small, strongly curved flippers with pointed tips: dark on top and bottom

Other Key Identifiers: Typically have a short, thick snout; Moderately long, dark, slender pectoral fins; A sharp crease between the beak and the forehead; Underside can be off-white, light grey or pinkish; Generally grey in color

Other Key Identifiers: Small head with a long rostrum without a demarcation between their gently sloping melon (or forehead) and rostrum; Pectoral fins are distinctively large; Dark grey bodies with a white throat and lips; body may be dotted with white, uneven splotches

Dorsal Fin: Tall, curved, sickle-shaped dorsal fin located mid-way down their back



Dorsal Fin: Tall, hooked dorsal fin located at the mid-back



Dorsal Fin: Small, triangular dorsal fin located at the mid-back



Dorsal Fin: Fairly tall, sickle-shaped dorsal fin located about two-thirds down their back



Fluke: Fluke is broad and curved with a deep median notch

Other Key Identifiers: Robust body with a rounded head; Bulbous head with a vertical crease and an indistinguishable rostrum; Typically dark gray with extensive white scarring originating from their top prey (squid); Pectoral fins are relatively long and thin, and pointed almost straight back

Other Key Identifiers: Small to medium-sized, robust, sleek body with a long, defined rostrum and round forehead; distinct and striking coloration pattern including bold, thin stripes that extend from the eye to the flipper; Small slender flippers; Underside is often white or has pink hues contrasting the body

Other Key Identifiers: Stocky body with a small, distinct rostrum; Small, pointed pectoral fins; Dark stripe that extends down their side from eye to pectoral flipper; upper body is bluish or brownishgray, while their underside is usually pale white or pink

Other Key Identifiers: Smallest baleen whale in North American waters; Small, dark, sleek body; Body is black to dark grayish/brownish, with a pale chevron on the back behind the head and above the flippers; Flat head and pointed snout; Small, slender, pointed flippers with distinctive white band

Dorsal Fin: Low, often stubby dorsal fin with broad base and "hump"



Dorsal Fin: Relatively small often stubby dorsal and positioned far along the back



Dorsal Fin: Tall, hooked dorsal fin, about two-thirds of the way back on the body, that rises at a shallow angle from the back



Dorsal Fin: Tall, hooked, slender dorsal fin located about two-thirds down their back



Fluke: Serrated along the trailing edge, pointed at the tips, and up to 18 ft wide



Fluke: Massive, slender flukes with smooth trailing edges



Fluke: Broad and tapered fluke



Fluke: Small in relation to body size



Other Key Identifiers: Long pectoral fins, up to 1/3 of body length with knobs on leading edges; Rounded protrusion at tip of lower jaw; Knobs on top of head and lower jaw; Dark grey to blue-black coloration on upperside with different variations of white on the underside

Other Key Identifiers: Largest animal on the planet; Long and slender body shape; Broad, flattened head; Raised splash guard in front of blow hole; Long, slender pectoral fins; 60-88 dark-colored throat grooves; Light grey-blue, mottled skin; Head uniformly (light) grey/blue; Very thick tail stock

Other Key Identifiers: Sleek, streamlined bodies with V-shaped heads; Flat head with no slope or angle toward the snout; Small and slender pectoral fins with pointed tips; Lower 'lip' is white on the right side, but dark on the left side; 50-100 throat grooves that extend to navel

Other Key Identifiers: Long, sleek body that is dark bluish-gray to black in color and white or cream-colored on the underside; Single ridge running from blowhole to tip of rostrum; Head slopes down from the blowhole to the snout; Slender and relatively short pectoral fins

Dorsal Fin: Pointed and strongly hooked dorsal fin located about two-thirds back on the body



Dorsal Fin: Slightly hooked dorsal fin with a wide base located far down the animal's back



Dorsal Fin: Triangular, falcate dorsal fin located far down the animal's back



Dorsal Fin: Fairly large, hooked dorsal fin located behind the midpoint of their back



Fluke: Broad fluke that is dark on top and pale on the bottom



Fluke: Relatively wide, thin fluke that lacks a well-defined notch



Fluke: Relatively broad fluke with a lack of well-defined notch



Fluke: Upper surface of the fluke is dark and underside has a series of lighter streaks



Other Key Identifiers: Three parallel ridges running from blowholes to the tip of the V- shaped snout; Large head that makes up to a quarter of total length; Small, slender, pointed pectoral fins; 40 - 70 throat grooves; Smoky grey body coloration

Other Key Identifiers: Medium-sized, round body; Low, sloping, indistinct forehead; Males may have tusk-like teeth that erupt and point forward from their heavily arched lower jaw; coloration varies from dark-gray to brownish and bluish with a pale underside

Other Key Identifiers: Round and robust body; Head is a sloping concave-shape with no obvious melon, an indistinct beak, and a large slit-like blowhole; Jaw-line is slightly upturned giving the whale a "smiling" appearance; Coloration ranges from dark gray to a reddish-brown, with a paler counter-shaded underside

Other Key Identifiers: Large, robust body; Dark, small, rounded, narrow pectoral fins that fit into a depression on either side of the body; Well-defined forehead with a long, tube-shaped beak; V-shaped, paired throat creases; darker grayish, bronze, brown, or olive coloration
